SULCATA TORTOISE

aka AFRICAN SPURRED TORTOISE

Geochelone sulcata

It is the third largest species of tortoise in the world and the largest species of mainland tortoise (not found on an island).

Due to the hot, dry habitat they live in the Sulcata's are crepuscular, meaning they are mostly active at dawn and dusk. When they get too hot they coat their skin with mud when available to cool off. When mud wallows are not available, they retreat to their

cooler burrows.

Our adult Sulcatas, like Georgie here, were hatched here in the mid 1970s. The babies pictured herehatchedin2007, offspring from our adult Sulcatas can often be seen in the reptile house.
