WALLAROO

Macropus robustus

"Wallaroo" may sound like the result of breeding a wallaby and a kangaroo, but it is actually a species in its own right.

The Eastern wallaroo is a rather stocky kangaroo with coarse, shaggy fur, a hairless muzzle, a relatively short, thick tail with a distinctive upright hopping style.

Linton is currently the only zoo in the UK where you are able to see this species.

The male is up to twice the size of the female.

Wallaroos, like other members of the Kangaroo family, can become pregnant soon after giving birth but the new embryo remains undeveloped until the pouch is free, this is known as "delayed implantation".

The Eastern wallaroo has shorter limbs than other kangaroo species which is thought to be an adaptation for leaping around on rocks.
